Police Issue Stay-at-Home Order Violation Warnings to Businesses

It has come to our attention that local police departments are issuing <u>Stay-At-Home Order violation warnings</u>. If your business continues to operate, you may receive a warning notice similar to the attached.

You need not close if you receive a warning notice and there is no violation as long as you: (a) employ only critical infrastructure workers; and/or (b) require only in-person attendance of employees conducting minimum basic operations. To avoid disruption of your workplace we recommend preparing an appropriate statement outlining why continued operations are permitted before the police arrive. You may wish to include other documentation, such as employee designation letters, to the police.
